What are Learning Communities about? Being the church, especially prepared to make hard, countercultural choices in the coming days so that we stay strong for Jesus no matter what.


"Live Not By Lies," by Rod Dreher describes people who stood strong under persecution when other "Christians" compromised. John Stonestreet on breakpoint.org summarized them as people who had:

- 1. A strong, dense community with a sense of belonging
- 2. Clarity of what is true no matter what society says, nailing it down in advance so that when they need to stand for truth they are ready
- 3. Love for their enemies

Themes in chapter 8

- **†** We should have a deep appreciation for what God as Father, Son and Holy Spirit, has done for us as we recognize how Jesus took the wrath of God for us out of His indescribable LOVE.
- **†** We must accept that God is beyond our comprehension. Acceptance that God is beyond us **Isaiah 55:8–9 (ESV)** ⁸For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways, declares the Lord. ⁹For as the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts.
- † It is God's righteousness upon us, not any righteousness that we have done.

 That will motivate us to live for Him, not cause us take Him for granted and do what we want



QUESTIONS 1-5, 2:18:20 to 2:23:19

- **2 Corinthians 5:21 (ESV)** ²¹For our sake he made him to be sin who knew no sin, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God.
- 1 John 1:8 (ESV) 8If we say we have no sin, we deceive ourselves, and the truth is not in us.

Question 4

Point #1: Paul says it is a legal term that means that the moment a person believes, "God legally or forensically declares them to be right with Him and treats them as right with Him."

Point #2: Your sin was "Imputed to Christ" (see Appendix on imputation), meaning it was transferred to Him so that he could be your substitute. Paul says, "God legally or forensically declared His Son to be guilty in our place and treated Him as guilty."

Point #3: Jesus on the cross did not "become corrupt or defiled or twisted or sinful, He was always the spotless Lamb of God." Paul Washer is foremost describing God's declaration of a sinner to be righteous based on the work of Jesus Christ, which is the doctrine of justification. Justification is very closely tied to another doctrine that is embedded in this verse and described by Paul Washer—it is the doctrine of double imputation, which is when your sin placed on Christ and Christ's righteousness given to you.
